

Laubwerk-Initials: Gothic Three Colour Painting

according to the Göttingem Model Book (XV c.). Title: laupp werck ("foliage")

This medieval illumination technique combines mineral, vegetal and artificial colours in order to achieve both detailled volume and intense luminosity.

- 1 Drawing (the object here being a part of an initial body) with lead/tin or silver point; then the outlines can eventually be redrawn with pen and ink. Replacement for histroic metal points: hard pencil (H2 to H4).
- 2) 1st colour: MINERAL COLOUR (here malachite; opaque and luminous, durable).
 - to be applied in several layers. The first layer can be quite liquid and thin; when dry, lay on other layers. Must be uniform and opaque.
 - Some mineral pigments damage brushes; use old or synthetic brush.
 - Instead of a mineral colour you can use a gouache.






1 Drawing of the main outlines

silver/lead point

2 main mineral colour, opaque, uniform first layer second layer

1st colour: malachite; cheap brush!



3rd colour:

ARTIFICIAL MINERAL COLOUR (here lead-tin-yellow or a non-poisonous replacement with chinese white and yellow).

- (1) Highlight the leaf edge and the dorsal vertebra.
- (8) Highlight the transitions into the inner surfaces of the leaves with diluted whiteyellow or a humid brush.

Light colour and sap green must never mix, they are opposite poles!



(7) hightlight on the (8) transition of the leaf edge hightlight

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3rd colour: lead tin yellow

2nd colour: ruta, iris or buckthorn sap green; good brush!
